My Monthly Blog By Clive Branson

Greetings and Welcome to my monthly blog. As you may know I produce a regular fishing Vlog on youtube. The name Vlog was derived from members of the youjtube platform whenever they filmed an event or a short video. Instead of it a blog they renamed it a Vlog. With nearly 4,000 members and even more viewers this platform is another vehicle to bring anglers the latest news and updates including my own match fishing results.



On this months vlog s I released two videos that I had fished on the River Wye during the Winter league. Both on the Belmont section at Hereford.

Its strange when we get different circumstances and these two matches certainly show the anglers the change in fortunes. From a zero to hero.

On the first vlog I drew peg 60 which is on the boatside of the river, about 40 yards above the boathouse. I was please about the draw as it is in an area that the fish are accumulating during the winter. In fact I was just 2 pegs below where I was in the last match, and if you follow me you will know that I had a great match catching 77lb of chub for a section win. However, peg 60 is one of the pegs without a platform to fish from. This peg was very awkward to fish and the only way I could, was to get into the water on my riggers platform. Unfortunately the platform was not secure and there was a chance of it slipping into the ice cold water. Mindful of this I also had another problem as the bank behind me was steep. Making fishing and casting very difficult indeed.

Nevertheless, I started on the Bread down the middle, as usual and soon I was getting bites, the problem however, was I started to bump a few and the hook was not connecting as it normally does. I thought perhaps the fish were too small for the size6 hook I had on my line. After a change down to a size 12 I stated to connect to a few chub around the 10 oz mark. I was catching very steady with a ball of my special chub mix every swim down. But suddenly half way through the match it slowed up for me. The angler above Mark Docherty, I found out later blasted the bait in and possibly drew the fish from me. I ended up with 39lb and well down in the section, in fact beating only 3 in the 12 peg section. You can see my vlog on; https://youtu.be/fvqWO 46iJw

The next Vlog was the penultimate league match on the same venue. I seem to be getting a good run of draws lately and this match was no exception. Drawing peg 95 on Belmont which is the noted peg under the town bridge, just bellow and opposite the boathouse on Belmont. The favourite peg 96 below was the nemesis to mine. Being an end peg and a peg that has won more matches on the river than any other I knew I had my work cut out especially when local angler Richard Downey had this end peg. Nevertheless I started the match on a 5gram boley float just a couple of rod lengths out, soon I was into some quality Roach. Although it was slow catching them it was steady, and for the next few hours I estimated about 25lb in my net. I was trying to pull up the fish from Richard, by blasting in loose feed, but with no success as he kept catching.

Thinking that I was going to catch a load of fish I had set up two keepnets at the beginning. The second keepnet was empty until the last hour when I chased the fish further out and down the middle. Low and behold with an hour to go the chub turned up, and I started to bag up, with a chub every run down that went into the second net. When the match had finished I was curing my luck for not doing this earlier as I am sure I would have had a huge weight, as the second net weighed in with 35lb. My first net had 25lb and a total of 60lb 4oz was enough for 2nd place in the section a place in the overall result picking up £130 prize money. The end peg just beat me with 67lb. The other good news was our team the Nomads although coming 5th on the day, we managed to hold on to 3rd position, now all to play for in the final match with 6 teams in contention for a place. £3.34m fine for Thames Water



the fine of £3.34 million imposed on Thames Water after the guilty verdict at Lewes Crown Court. Thames Water were at fault after a "reckless" incident in 2017 which saw the death of more than 1,700 fish.

The trial heard how Thames Water had allowed sewage to spill for a "significant and lengthy" period, polluting the Gatwick Stream and River Mole between Crawley in West Sussex and Horley in Surrey on 11 October 2017.

In sentencing the water company, Judge Laing KC condemned Thames Water for actions that had deliberately misled the Environment Agency during its investigation.

The court was told that a storm pump unexpectedly activated and filled up the storm tank, despite no substantial rainfall, for 21 hours, which went unnoticed. The pump then spilled sewage into the river for an estimated six hours, but no alarm was in place to alert staff to the overspill and when an alarm was finally heard, the lead technician was uncontactable because they were awaiting a new mobile phon

"This pollution incident had a devastating impact on the River Mole, killing thousands of fish and destroying the fishery for our member clubs. It's good to see the courts taking this seriously and imposing substantial fines but sadly this money is still going into Treasury coffers rather than back into the promised environmental improvements for which the Angling Trust has been campaigning.

"The levels of negligence and incompetence demonstrated by this incident are bad enough, but it is simply unacceptable for a water company to try and cover up the magnitude of their errors by misleading the Environment Agency's investigation. It is further evidence of the changes Thames Water need to make to their culture and operating procedures if they are to continue running our water supply and wastewater management. Currently we have a broken water sector and it's fish and wildlife that are paying the price for these failures."

The verdict comes on the same day as evidence was revealed in the High Court that water companies discharged raw sewage into rivers and seas via storm overflows more than 300,000 times last year, for a total of 1.75m hours. While this is a slight drop from the 2021 figures of 372,553 for over 2.7m hours it remains a major source of pollution and the Storm Overflow Reduction plan announced by the government won't see this tackled until 2050

Revealed: these are the 20 most polluted rivers in the UK

Sewage was pumped into our waterways for more than 2.4 million hours in just one year

The country's rivers are facing a bit of a shitshow right now. All over the UK, waterways have become dumping grounds for eye-watering amounts of sewage. According to recent data, water companies pumped



waste into rivers across England and Wales for a total of 2.4 million hours (or 388 years) in just 12 months.

The campaign group 'Top of the Poops' says that this figure has decreased since 2020 but not by any amount worthy of celebration. Now the group has collated data from the Environment Agency to reveal the 20 most polluted rivers in the UK.

The worst affected river was the Severn, the longest in the country. In just one year it had sewage pumped into it on 2,656 separate occasions by Severn Trent Water for a total of 28,741 hours. The River Calder shortly follows, with Yorkshire Water having discharged 27,901 hours' worth of waste at 4,055 different instances. Despite its murky brown hue, the Thames doesn't make an appearance on the list. In fact, many might be shocked to know it is actually one of the cleanest city rivers in the world.

'Top of the Poops' explains that the findings are likely to be an underestimate because companies don't monitor sites reliably or consistently. Prime minister Rishi Sunak has said that he would 'welcome tougher fines for water companies' despite rumours that the government would scrap the overall £250 million penalty it was going to charge the major culprits.

Power of the people prevents pumping into Test



The people of Longparish and Chilbolton were alarmed to see Southern Water setting up overland pipes and pumps, preparing to dump wastewater from overflowing sewers directly into the River Test.

Groundwater levels are currently high following a sustained period of unusually high rainfall. Tankers had been used to ease the pressure on the system but last week the creaking sewage infrastructure finally looked as if it was going to require emergency pumping.

After being contacted by several concerned residents, I headed to Longparish and Chilbolton to investigate. As I moved between the villages, I was heartened to see the united community spirit of those that live near and work on the River Test.

Groups were gathering at spots where dumping was rumoured to be starting and, dotted along the river, riverkeepers kept watch over their patch in case the water company should turn up to start their environmental vandalism.

Our River Test is one of only 200 chalk streams in the world and a Site of Special Scientific Interest. It is a rare and precious natural gift at the heart of our community which we rightly cherish and want to protect.

Faced with overwhelming opposition from residents, riverkeepers and politicians and with journalists from both local and national outlets gathering, Southern Water backed down and decided not to proceed with the pumping.

Alex Saunders, Head of Wastewater Networks at Southern Water, is reported saying: "We've listened to local councillors and other stakeholders and will not be installing over pumping."

The quote implies that Southern Water intended to pump wastewater into the Test, until the pressure from the people forced them to reconsider. Compare this to a letter from Lawrence Gosden, the CEO of Southern Water, to Longparish Parish Council, which is published on the council's website, that states: "The team set up the equipment as part of testing our contingent readiness for an extreme emergency; however, it was a mistake to do so."

This reads as if the setting up of equipment was little more than a training exercise and there was never any intention to pump into the Test. Perhaps he should talk to his Head of Wastewater Networks.

In his letter, Lawernce Gosden also states: "You have my personal assurance that we will not be pumping into the River Test." Well, Mr Gosden, we will hold you to your word, now and in the future.

What the Otter trust say: We strongly oppose calls for an otter cull.

We're concerned by the current 'cull everything' attitude adopted by the government—this is something that we constantly monitor by working alongside other well-respected otter groups and, should a cull ever be announced, we're ready to fight it. The Old Nene at March was brilliant fishing to-day ,except if you drew one of the 10 pegs on the bypass section , yes I drew peg 97 didn't catch for the first hour and then started to catch the odd roach against the boat at 16 mts, cupped in groundbait with pinkies, too far to loose feed so kept topping up , .6 gram DT Nevis 20 hook to .09 really difficult to cup in as I had a really steep bank behind me and had to double unship fed again at 14.5 mts and managed to catch there finishing with 106 roach and perch for 6 lbs 8 ozs enough to win the section, never worked so hard for £50. March Open River Old Nene. 100 pegs #prestoninnovations #matrex #sonubaits #vandeneynde





Partly frozen lake made it tough to catch big fish, luckily for me I drew a peg that was full of small roach, so that was my attack fished 10 mts .2 gram DT Nevis steady float 20 hook to .09 light elastic. Loose fed pinkies and a few big maggots with pinkie on the hook ,Caught 331 small roach for 12 lb 9 ozs and more important a lake win, you have to have a special mentality for this style of fishing I wouldn't want to do it every week but that's match fishing you just have to concentrate on whatever you think you need to do to win. Saturday Winter League Peg 6 Willow lake Meadow Farm Fishery Norwich

Lovely match today finished 2 nd on the lake with 27 ide and 14 carp/ F1's for 43lbs 13 ozs just over a 1lb short of winning, cupped in pinkies and 2mm hard feed carp pellets at 14 mts just in the deepest water before it started to shallow up, loose fed big flouro maggots from there to the far bank caught at all depths on the drop .2 gram DT steady float strung out 18 hook to .10 maggot hooked through middle (only just nicked) was best, just kept varying distance and depth, caught tight over on deck in the last 1.5 hours a mixture of carp and Ide, really enjoyable match only2 lost fish had to shot the float well down with hardly any bristle showing and strike at everything. As most of you know Ireland is the land of lakes, rivers and streams. Water water everywhere and most of it fishable. This winter has seen incessant rain however, so much so that many venues have been over the fields and so far away they have become unapproachable. Not so the lattice work of canals that meander their way across the country. Once neglected by both the EPA and Inland Fisheries Ireland many had become almost dry ditches or so weeded were unusable to both boaters and anglers alike. These days however there has been a degree of restoration work done and it hasn't taken very long before we had a rich addition to Irelands bountiful angling resource.



In many respects they are still ignored by the angling fraternity. They don't know what they are missing. There has been an explosion of all species and many are now of specimen size. I absolutely love them. Being brought up on the Yorkshire and Nottinghamshire rivers and cuts in the 60,s made us hone our skills to be as sharp as our local barbers cut throat razor. In those 'good' old days if you had 4lbs in a 40 pegger on the canal at Keadby you would be in the money.

Our canals are light years away from that but still need to be fished with a degree of delicacy to get the best out of them especially when they are brimming the banks and the air temperature is down to zero. I have my way of doing it and I would like to share it with you.



I am so fortunate. Within 20 minutes from my house I can be settled on 3 different canals. In winter I tend to fish short sessions sometimes no more than 3 hours and always in the afternoons. I am not a one method man and although if I had to pick a method on canals to save my life it would probably be the pole, I often fish a waggler and the whip up to 8 metres can be deadly on it's day.

So lets talk about the whip this time. I almost always fish alongside at least one angler, often several. What surprises them is why the quality of my fish is always much better than theirs and it makes for a good craic and free Guinness in my local in Strokestown as I keep shtum until we've done.

I almost always use groundbait. Yes I know most lads think it's the kiss of death when the weather is enough to freeze your bits off but not so. It's down to how much you use and more to the point what you put in it, I fine sieve brown crumb. I do a 50 50 mix with a dark additive, usually Sensas but to be honest most of the leading additives do the job equally as well. I then give this a liberal dose of PV1 binder. Yep, mainly forgotten these days but still does a job under the right circumstances. When I wet it and the consistency is as I want it I shove it through a fine riddle so it looks 'fluffy' and has no lumps. I then split it in half. To one mix I load and I mean load red pinkies and the other half load with flouro pinkies. Quite often one colour works marginally better than the other so it's best to cover all options. If their is a bit of colour in the water I bait three lines and that means making sure you are accurate and the nugget you put in is bound



enough to take the lot down to the deck. This eliminates line bites and tiny fish picking up your bait on the way down. I also put the alternative colour pinkies on a fourth line and tend to leave it for a while.

Terminal tackle needs to be very fine and above all sensitive. Whatever float I use on the whip I seldom go under a gramme. Accuracy and positivity is the rule of thumb and if you have gear on that's blowing about in the wind, believe me your are on to a loser. I either use one of my own slim style rugby shape with a carbon stem or a Colmic of a similar style. Main line for winter conditions is never more than 0.014 MAP, with a 0.10 or less MAP hook length. If I have around 6ft of water I start off with bulk about 2ft 6inches up from the hook. My first stot style weight up from my hook is a number 10. This as a starter is around 12 inches up from the hook and then between that and the bulk spaced out are two number 8s. I often move these around several times during a session as per how the fish are feeding. Once my gear is finally balanced, unlike some who fish just a blip of float showing I tend to leave a little more. Not much more but enough to pull down. The fine bristle has little buoyancy and I tend to miss less bites by leaving a little more float showing.

Hooks need to be as fine wire as you can get and stay needle sharp. I've recently started using Owner Japanese hooks of the Sodje pattern. I've now caught some pretty big fish on them including Tench and had no problems and boy, do they stay sharp. The size 18s are more like a 19 and I load it up with at least 3 pinkies. I see lads put one pinky on a 20 and smile as they bag up on fish weighing 20 to a pound. The better fish go for a bit of a mouthful believe me.

Start off steady. I seldom fish less than 5metres for a good reason. Fishing close in can produce well for a while but better fish tend to 'cop' on and move out. They tend to stay there and once you establish a rhythm with the bigger handfull's, well into double figures is easily attainable in match time.

Get the baiting right. You get to feel how it's going and to add a little more or less is down to experience. It's not rocket science as they say. It works. Try it on your local cut. I don't think you will be disappointed.

Angler Killed Report

Ian Coates murderer accepts Manslaughter

The son of Ian Coates, one of three people stabbed to death in Nottingham, said his father's killer was the "most evil person on this planet".



The school caretaker was killed along with students Barnaby Webber and Grace O'Malley-Kumar, both 19, on 13 June. 2023

James Coates described Valdo Calocane as cold, calculated and brutal.

Calocane is being sentenced after pleading guilty to three counts of manslaughter on the basis of diminished responsibility.

Mr Coates, 65, was driving his van in Magdala Road when he was repeatedly stabbed, suffering wounds to his abdomen and chest. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

Calocane has also admitted three counts of attempted murder after driving Mr Coates's van, which he had stolen, at three people following the killings.

Mr Coates worked at the Huntingdon Academy in Nottingham and was four months from retirement at the time of his death.



Round 4 of the Wye league today! After what seams like an eternity we finally got back on the Wye today, River levels were relatively low but at least it wasn't too cold so hope we're high that most areas would produce an odd bite... With Cotswold top of the league we were desperate to get a decent set of pegs and get ourselves into pole position... with the river so liable to flooding it's always best to be at the front as you just don't know if you'll get on the river again before the season ends! So all pumped up I pulled out an envelope hopefully full of screamers.. what actually came out was one of the draws I dread!

Poor Rob Robert Brennan knew his run in the 90's would be short lived was on doomsday peg 20, Robbo in 41 not too bad not too good! Scott was at least in amongst them on 75 on the railings while big D stepping in for playboy Rory Jones on a good one in the shape of 56 Lee Edwards got his wish to be in the town... 88 was not where he wanted though a tricky peg at best on a low River...





Job to be done though it looked to me like a damage limitation job peg 100's in with 91-96 all flyers and 101 and 102 both pegs capable of nicking a few points with the resident chub and Barbel.

I made the decision to cast well down towards 102 where the barbel live 50 mins on the maggot feeder with no bites was concerning but a switch to bomb and meat turned it round! Elsewhere the lads have smashed it Rob unfortunately went biteless along with 9 others in A section Robbo smashed B section while Scott and Dan recorded 2nds and Lee 3rd to win the day with 52pts and take a 6 point lead over Cotswold!

Tom Boulton and Anthony Taylor tied on the day with 97-6-9 well done lads!

By the end I'd put together 66lbs enough for 2nd in section behind Anthony Taylor's impressive match winning 111lbs and 5th in the match.



NORTH BURLINGHAM FISHERIES,

NORTH BURLINGHAM, NORFOLK


DESCRIPTION. This tidy fishery, attractive to families, is set on farmland in the Norfolk countryside. It's a privately owned venue with two 0.5-acre pools to fish. Circular shaped St Andrew's Pond has carp to 12 lb, bream to 2 lb, roach to 1 lb and the occasional elusive tench. The key shaped St Peter's Pond is a little heavier stocked and has carp to 12 lb, tench to 5 lb, bream to 2 lb, crucians to 1 lb 8 oz and roach to 1 lb. TACTICS. Float fishing is the preferred option. The carp have a liking for strawberry flavoured corn fished in singles or doubles, either to the easily reachable islands or in the margins. Float fish maggot, caster, chopped worm, bits of paste or bread, over a few free offerings, for various species. It may be worth trying a floating bait late in the day for a better carp or two.

GOOD SWIMS. Anywhere really, the swims are spacious. TICKETS. £5, across the board. Tickets on the bank or from the on-site farm shop. Fishing dawn until dusk only. Disabled access. No keepnets. Barbless hooks only. Toilets. Food available. Enquiries: 07747 758914. Anglian byelaws. Open all year.

Also carp to 15 lb, tench to 6 lb, perch and roach/bream hybrids to 3 lb, perch to 2 lb and pike. TACTICS. This is a typical feeder fishing for bream water. Fill the feeder with a good brown cereal with chopped worm, caster and hemp. On the hook try worm, maggot and caster. Pole or waggler fish maggot, caster or pellet for mixed catches. Tench to




TACTICS. Leger halibut pellets or boilies for the bigger carp. For tench and bream try a crumb feeder at distance with corn, bread, redworms or maggots. Tench are generally caught at distance but they can show to pole fished corn. Plenty of roach and skimmers to soft pellet or maggot close in.

GOOD SWIMS. The two ends tend to give you more of the lake to go at.



Clive Roberts Memoirs

Part 2 The 70s

The early 1970s arrived and with only Roath Park left in South Wales our winter league was transferred to the Bristol Avon at Newbridge near Bath. This was then a roach and dace venue as the Bream had yet to populate, and chub was were scares.



In the 70s the pole had yet to make an appearance on the venue, and the best method was the Avon float, made popular by Mervyn Haskins, nicknamed "Topper" hence the Topper float was named. However we also used a sliding float with great affect, a method we had learnt from the East Dock in Cardiff, before the Taff pollution.

Newbridge had then became a major venue along with the Fry's section of the Avon. These were used for our winter leagues, they also attracted many anglers from the midlands and London. New methods were also being learnt such as bread flake fishing by the local anglers, and also greased line for the many dace present, all caught on the rod and line, no whips in them days. The Bristol Avon was a tough venue in winter, and weights were low.

At that time we noticed that many Cardiff clubs were going up the Wye and the river Lynfi, a wye tributary. Also the river Usk, traveling by coach, catching large bags of fish. These venues were very similar in pace to the river Taff, and I found them easy to fish. The Wye in those days were a chub and dace river, no Barbel or bleak about in those days.

Most of my successful results in those days were mainly sections wins on the Bristol Avon and Roath Park lake Cardiff, where I practiced every week. The river Wye became more productive for me where I won a couple of matches in my first season there.


Over to the river Usk, and even today is one of my favourite venues where I won four matches in my first four attempts, with 40lb of dace being my best weight. The river Usk is a predominantly a game river and anglers were only allowed to fish for the coarse fish certain times of the year, and only if the coarse fish were removed afterwards. Finding where to put the fish we caught was always a dilemma and some times when possible the fish were taken to the river Taff. Although when possible when nobody was looking the fish were put back into the Usk . Maybe because of this rule many South Wales clubs stopped fishing the river and in my view it was a shame.

As a footnote one of my methods I perfected was a mixture of Molehill and boiled rice as boiled rice looked like maggots, in those days money was a bit tight, and with just a handful of maggots it worked a treat.

During our practice sessions myself and traveling partner Clive Branson found that the dace responded better in coloured water and by introducing molehill in the correct consistency it would colour the water and the dace responded well. Perhaps this was the first time anyone ever introduced molehill into the water, with great affect.

By 1972 I was fishing a wide range of venues and was learning my skills, another venue that we fished was the Huntspill drain in Somerset. Using a method called the swingtip the matches attracted over 200 anglers at a time. I managed a few placing on the Spill including a 2nd on an Open match with 40lb

A historic trip during this period was a team match in the midlands after being selected by my team Cardiff Nomads for the NFA All England on the river Severn. It was the last of the team only weight matches, and I done ok weighing in 7lb including two 4oz barbel, the first time I had ever seen this species and was still new to the venue.



On that day a certain 1969 World Champion Robin Harris won the match with 40lb and that was considered a great weight on the day.

Tackle in the 70s

The tackle we used in the 1970s was much different than what we use today My Fishing rod was an Enterprise Milbro fibreglass and an open fixed spool reel called an intrepid and sometimes an Ariel centrepin reel was used. My basket was a wicker and the rod holdall was an Effgeco.

As always manufactures strive to improve their products to capture the market and carbon rods were on the way, ABU a Swedish company brought out the closed faced reels including the 501, 503, and the 505

Michell Match open face reels were the most popular open faced reel, and both had their fan clubs. Personally I became an Abu fan for many years. I don't use them now but plenty of my friends still do, including Clive Branson and Richy Candy. I have tried to convince them to change as I have, to



open face reels. Both good anglers and would probably still do well on whatever they use as I find them hard to beat anyway

So on to the mid-70s and by now I was obsessed with match fishing, the problem was however fishing so many different venues I could not concentrate on just one. Trying to beat local anglers on their own venues was very difficult because of their knowledge of the waters. This still applies even today. This resulted in many years of getting a battering, but fishing a wide range of venues eventually paid off, gathering and building a wide range of skills which would help in my future successes.

My Younger Successful Days

JOHN C ESSEX Memoirs



An angler since the age of twelve John's first love was match fishing. After an invitation by Ivan Marks, he joined the Leicester 'Likely Lads' team which won National Angling Championship medals in 1971, 1973, 1974, 1975 and 1977.

John's wins include the Great Ouse Championship, the Trent East Midland Regional Woodbine Final and the Fenland Championship, as well as finishing third individual in the 1975 Nene Division 1 National. His best fish in that event was a carp of 6.41kg - a record fish at the time.

A back problem forced him to retire from the match circuit, and in 1977 he concentrated on coaching the Leicester Junior side. With Roy Jeffery as team manager and ably supported by coaches Trevor Tomlin and the legendary Ivan Marks, these young lads and lasses won the NFA National Junior Team Championship in 1974, 1977, 1980, 1983 and 1985.


After ten years of chiropractic treatment John drifted back into fishing for carp and after two years caught his first twenty from Birstall lake, no more than two miles from his home. He later progressed to margin floater fishing, taking many twenties from his local club lake

John is an avid collector of angling books and old tackle, with an extensive library of nearly 1000 books. He has written many articles on angling history for Angler's Mail, the Angling Star, Classic Angling and Waterlog.

John has been actively involved in angling administration since the 1970s (serving on several club committees) and he chaired the Leicestershire Angling Federation for thirty years, working on behalf of anglers and angling clubs in Leicestershire.

John has kindly agreed to share his match history memoirs to our Monthly publication and website





Just thought I would go a little 'off piste' and blow my own trumpet as it were. I was putting in some additional research on the National Angling Championships and suddenly it dawned on me that very few match anglers had ever appeared in the UK Guinness Book of Records linked to the British Championships. The UK version of this book went the way of the dodo morphing into the 'World' record version. First mentioned in the UK version is the great James Henry Royston Bazley, twice winner of the All England in 1909 and 1927. Also there is Dave Burr who set the angling world alight with his record individual National winning weight of 76-9-0 on the Huntspill in 1965. And then there is me!! After my third placed catch in 1975, which included a carp of 14-2-0, Colin Graham of Angling News Services contacted the GBR and I must have followed this up with a letter to them to which I did get a reply confirming its inclusion in the record books. I thought I had a certificate but cant find it. I do however have a very wide blue and white GBR tie awarded to record holders at a small cost. I could have worn that and would have set another record as the only angler to fish the National wearing such a tie! The mind boggles. Only Baz's record remains unbeaten as that is prior to the divisional matches which started in 1972. What a thrill for me to be mentioned on the same page as Jim Bazley. 31

The John C Essex Match Memories

This might evoke a few memories for some of the anglers who fished the match circuits and competed in the nationals during the 70's. Today, the 8th of September 2023, marks the 50th anniversary of the 58th National Angling Championship which took place on the River Witham in 1973 from Southrey to Langrick.

Team favourites with bookie Jim Wooding on the day were Leicester AS at 3-1, Birmingham 4-1 then Leeds, Coleshill and Lincoln at 10-1. As it turned out Leicester finished second on 709 points with Leeds third also on 709 points but Leicester had nearly 96 lbs to Leeds 57 lbs. So who won? Jim Wooding initially had Grimsby and District at 20-1 but they outshone the star teams of the day finishing on 717 points amassing a magnificent 92-10 to take the honours on the day.


Had it not been decided on points then Leicester AS, captained by Ivan Marks, would have had the best total team weight (and won) in three successive Nationals. But the decision by the membership of the NFA to decide the National on total team points from 1972 heralded a new approach to team fishing. Kevin Ashurst said 'In terms of weight, it

would have been an even greater match if more anglers had used the leger. And we all know why so many didn't.' I know that to my cost as the team plan for a minimum of 2lb proved to be a struggle on my peg.

Some teams in my section fished the bomb all day and caught odd bream, not many but enough. When I had a go for them on the tip I never had a bite and all the time the 'catch 2lb' team orders nagged away at my thoughts. Very negative fishing and my less than impressive performance probably cost our team a winner's medal. I should have fished the bomb all day but daren't risk it. But at Langrick on peg M4 Alan Wright shocked the angling world by winning the first of his two National titles by putting together 41-10-8 of bream on a stick float rather than a swingtip. He pipped Leicester's Dave Downes to the title by just 4 ½ ounces.

Dave fished also fished team orders to catch 2 lbs of small fish before going for bream which he eventually did on C64 at Stixwould. He wasted the first hour of the match before switching to a quiver tip (yes even then) rather than a swingtip. Docker Nev Fisher, who took fifth place with 27-7-3 for 14-1 Grimsby, led the way for Grimsby but their captain George Hallam, a 42 year old dock supervisor, won B section contributing 17-9-8 and a brilliant 79 points to the team total. Well done Grimsby who duly celebrated their victory. As the winning team Grimsby won Gold Sovereigns in presentation cases.

For my book on the National I was very grateful to Nev Fisher and members of the Grimsby team for supplying photographs. Wonderful history!





I was very surprised that in my last blog on-one asked about two times National Champion James Henry Royston Bazley. I can only guess that most of you already know and have read about him in my book on the National. I read Jims book 'The Art of Coarse Fishing' when I was a young lad. Brilliant match man, specimen hunter, writer and angling administrator J H R Bazley (Baz) was a piscatorial enigma whose angling exploits and worthy deeds did much to raise the profile of our rapidly evolving sport in the early part of the twentieth century.

To my mind Jim Bazley's success at match fishing puts him on a par with the likes of Coventry's Billy Lane and the legendary Ivan Marks. One contemporary report, from a Yorkshire newspaper dating from 1910, makes interesting reading. 'Mr Bazley must be



a bit of a terror to North Country anglers who fish in competitions! Armed with the "Illingworth" reel, which permits of a very light bait and float being cast almost any reasonable distance, he again beat 399 other anglers in the recent big competition on the Bank Holiday. The match took place on the Swale near Skipton Bridge, and the winner was Mr. Bazley with 5lb. 1 ½ oz., the next Mr. Vernon, of Leeds, with 2lb. 11 3/4oz. During the past few years Mr. Bazley has secured the English Championship (the only one in which he took part), two "All-England" contests, three Leeds and District Amalgamation matches, and second in another (he got these three firsts and one second prize against over 2500 competitors). He has won eleven silver cups and twenty-two gold medals, and he has one of the finest collections of specimen fish to be seen anywhere.' During his angling career Jim caught many fine fish, mainly in Yorkshire, and as such they should be judged as pretty special. He caught fifty 2lb plus roach in one month from Hornsey Mere and according to the record books his best roach weighed 2lb 15-½ oz, biggest dace 14 ¾ oz, barbel 7lb 12 oz and chub 5lb 8oz.

Jim was a very competent "game fisherman" and on trip to the Teviot landed 161 grayling in three days (just 12 ½ hours) fishing. Trout of 8 ¼, 6 ¼ and 5 lbs in one day at Blagdon to set a venue record. He took the largest Yorkshire pike of 30 lbs from Hornsea Mere in 1927. So delighted was he with the catch he took a taxi all the way back to the Leeds Anglers Club and marched in with the fish cradled in his arms - still alive! A regular columnist for The Fishing Gazette, Anglers News and Yorkshire Evening Post, he also wrote 8 angling books including a "Guide to Angling Resorts" (1909) on behalf of the Great Northern Railway, and the very humorous "Fishing Stunts" in 1919. President of the National Federation of Anglers he also held the position of Leeds President for two 7-year periods. Eventually the Government Standing Joint Committee on River Pollution called upon him and he became Conservator, Deputy Chair and finally Chairman of the Yorkshire Fishery Board. Passed away in 1933.

The angler who catches a fish worthy to be converted into a trophy usually manages to celebrate the occasion. That this was true two centuries ago is, to judge from the picture, abundantly clear.

THE SQUIRE'S PIKE

O N a certain evening in the year 1775, a select little gathering of elegantly costumed gentlemen was assembled in the snug wainscoted parlour of a Northamptonshire manor, the home of Sir Jeremy Allgood, affectionately known to his friends as the Squire. Of those so honoured who took their seats around the mahogany, in the centre of which was a magnificent punchowl, magnificently filled for this occasion, my Lord Carping, the Squire's oldest crony, sat on his left. Facing him across the table was Mr. Peter de Coverley, a grandson of the famous Sir Roger, a handsome and robust young man no less fashionably attired than his companions, except that he wore his own abundant unpowdered hair. On de Coverley's right sat the Hon. John Pettigrew of Salisbury town. The fifth member of the party, a young dependant of the Squire's, distinguished by his modest and respectful demeanour (for the Squire was a wealthy and a childless man), was Ensign Trim, of His Majesty's Regiment of Foot Guards. The trophy, a fine pike of 20 lb., caught in the Squire's own river, had earlier been inspected and admired, for the taxidermy, a comparatively new art in that age, had been carried out with unusual care.

MARGIN FISHING FOR CARP

A T Mr. Ingham's request ("Letters to the Editor," April 5th issue) here is what I know about the development and practice of margin fishing.

Specialist carp-fishers will know that the effectiveness of any method of fishing for this species in any given water decreases the more it is used. It is the fashion nowadays to rate the intelligence of fish at a very low level, and to talk wisely about conditioned reflexes and response to stimuli. In fact, fish are quite intelligent—none more so than the carp—and they are quite capable of learning that a line attached to something edible spells danger.

From about 1932 onwards I regularly fished a pond which contained carp, and

I regularly fished a pond which contained carp, and caught a number of them by the usual methods, the most effective of which was floating crust, cast well out on the usual greased line. This method was also used by many other anglers, since an angling club had the fishing rights of the pond, which was quite small. The quantity of bread cast upon its waters during the summer became considerquantity of bread cast upon its waters during the summer became considerable, and a great many carp were hooked, a few being landed. By 1935 the fish had become very crafty about floating bread. They would never touch the ordinary crust on a greased line; the nearest they came to doing so was to swirl violently close to it, repeating this until the sodden crust broke up and the hook sank. At a discreet interval afterwards, they would return and devour the pieces. One or two were circumvented by the old dodge of casting out a big crust attached to the line and having the hook concealed in a much smaller piece; but the whole business was obviously becoming less and less effective, even at night, which had by then become about the only time when one could hope for a fish, mainly due to the increasing number of people who fished the water, and who, like anglers all over the country, never really believed that fish could see, or detect vibrations on the bank; an attitude which, I may say, has not altered appreciably between then and now.

During the summer of 1935 I spent several nights carp-fishing, and I could not

During the summer of 1935 I spent several nights carp-fishing, and I could not fail to observe that as soon as dusk had come and other anglers had packed up, the carp would come right in to the bank after crusts, etc. They would even compete with the numerous rats for them, which was sometimes quite comical. Late that summer it dawned on me that to throw a crust twenty yards out into the pool was rather stupid, when I had seen numerous carp take crusts within a couple of yards of where I sat.

GIVEN THE CLUE

If, at that time, I had read H. T. Shering-ham's "Coarse Fishing" I might have worked it out earlier. Here is what he says, writing in 1912. "At dusk the fish begin to roam in search of food, and in a lake they will cruise about among the weeds and reeds close inshore. Often, just at dusk, you can see the tips of the reeds swaying as some softly-moving fish, per-

haps of great size, makes its way through them. And when the light is gone you can hear rustlings, and sucking noises, and an occasional great splash, which are somewhat alarming." Later in the same chapter he says: "In warm weather carp swim near the surface, and it does not take long to call their attention to floating bread—the crowd of lesser fishes will soon do that."

Those two extracts contain the two basic principles of margin fishing, and why they remained unconnected so long has always

amazed me—unless it is that very few anglers can be persuaded to fish without float or lead!

The first attempt I made resulted in a The first attempt I made resulted in a fish being hooked and breaking me in short order. In those days my ideas about tackle were decidedly unsound! I thought that a size 8 hook was large and a 6 lb. line was strong; the water was heavily weeded and well-sprinkled with snags and lily-pads. However, before the season finished, I did get a fish of 9 lb. by margin fishing, which encouraged me to persist in it during the season 1936, which followed.

LEARNING THE GAME

During that season I learned that there was more in the method than just hanging a crust over the edge of the bank. I found that anything more than a ripple on the water was fatal to success; that it pays to observe the direction of drift of floating objects and fish into it; that small rudd, and sometimes rats, would demolish a soaked crust in no time, but that carp would reject a fresh crust insufficiently soaked and still hard. I also found that, while it was very important to keep the while it was very important to keep the line off the water, if it was taut, a carp would suck the crust clean off the hook, and it was essential to have a foot or more falsely line between buttering and road of slack line between butt-ring and reel, to give the fish a chance to turn with the batt before feeling any pull. 1936 saw quite a number of carp landed by margin fishing, including some fair fish up to 12½ lb.; and I began the 1937 season with considerable confidence that I had a technique which was going to be effective—so much so that I explained it to one or two friends. This confidence was not misplaced. In 1937 I caught my first lifteen-pounder by the method, and quite a number of other big fish were taken by it in the following two seasons. Then came the war, and with it little opportunity to fish; but in 1946 I was back after them again, and had a fifteen-pounder and a sixteen-pounder in that year.

THE EXPERTS INTERESTED

At that time I was given a copy of "BB's" "Fisherman's Bedside Book"; and I was so interested in what the author had I was so interested in what the author had to say about carp that I wrote to him; the letter appears in "Confessions of a Carpfisher." "BB" came to stay with me in 1947 and in a week landed five specimen carp by margin fishing. Michael Traherne also found it successful, and said so in his "Be Quiet and go a-Angling." Later, I explained the idea to Bernard Venables, who featured it in his "Mr. Crabtree" strip; and I understand that fish over 20 lb. in weight have

over 20 lb, in weight have succumbed to it during the

season which has passed.

It is important to see the It is important to see the method in its right perspective. It is not an infallible method of catching carp, nor is it the deadliest. It is a good method under the right conditions and a valuable addition to the carp-fisher's repertoire. In some waters it is almost useless, and it should never be tried in anyit is almost useless, and it should never be tried in anything but warm and practically windless weather. It requires practically no skill until a fish is hooked, but it does require intelligent observation and iron self-control. After using the method for a long time, I still miss many fish through wrong timing of the strike—which should be gentle. It is necessary to remain conwhich should be gentle. It is necessary to remain concealed and to sit still; and the last is not always easy, especially when one can hear great suckings and "sloshings" fifty yards

Since the method was first invented, it has been found that it is effective in the has been found that it is effective in the daytime, provided one can fish without interference from other anglers, which is seldom. In fact, my bigger fish caught by margin fishing were taken during midmorning. Ducks, waterfowl and rats are a nuisance and often render it impossible to use a floating crust, however fished.

Besides carp, roach, rudd and tench can be taken by this means. I have never actually set out to catch anything but carp in this way, but occasionally a big rudd, and once a tench of 5 lb. 10 oz. insisted on being caught, and only the large size of the crust I use has prevented this from happening more often. ing more often.

ing more often.

The tackle to use is chosen mainly on its suitability for the water concerned; in open waters a No. 6 forged hook and a line of 6 to 8 lb. b.s.—and plenty of it—ought to serve. If weeds and snags exist, you must fish stouter; a No. 2 hook and a 12 or 15-lb. line may be necessary to give you a fair chance of landing a fish. Ordinary roach rods are unsuitable and so are spinning rods; but the latter, not too powerful, will have to serve most anglers until the tacklemakers decide to make a rod which really is right for carp-fishing. Fortunately for me, I make my own. As for reels, that with which you feel you can best play a fish which may weigh 20 or even 30 lb. is the one to use; reliability and line-capacity are the main features to look for.



Legends in my Lifetime New Series (Part2)

Starting from an early age as a young budding match angler at the tender age of 14 I befriended an Angler called Larry Powell. Who was a local match angler from my hometown of Cardiff in South Wales?

Larry was an exceptional angler by those days' standard winning on a constant basis. Not just local

but on open matches as far away as the River Seven, Bristol Avon and Gloucester Canal.

In fact, Larry became good friends with a few midland Anglers such as Ken Giles, Clive Smith and Les Prust just to mention a few. My guess is that quality anglers got to know the standard of the opposition and soon became friends mainly to learn off each other which of course gave them an edge.

Larry who in my opinion as a brilliant angler could have gone on and done particularly well on the World Championship stage. Alas we will never know because unfortunately Larry passed away at an early age due to health issues becoming an alcoholic. Verging on the edge of brilliance or madness Larry was a one-off, thinking nothing about diving in underwater just to see how fish responded in the flow of the river or the depth of the lake and in any weather.

His preparation to detail was perhaps the best I had ever witnessed when it came to mixing his groundbait or preparing his bait. Something I learnt from an early age the more preparation the better you become as efficiency is the name of the game when it came to matchfishing. Not making mistakes and having something in its place if it did, saving time and motion allowing to catch more fish. Something, that all the top anglers would do as I found later in my career.

During the 60s Larry won more matches in the South Wales circuit than any other angler including Welsh National Championships, Wye Championships, Taff Championships, Roath Park Lake, Bristol Avon and River Seven championships. As a young budding Match angler, I teamed up with Larry in my teenager years and learnt the basics of winning matches, he taught me many things and had some great days fishing I will always be eternally grateful to him. It was a shame he never knew his prodigy would one day become a World Champion.

For those who remember Larry and his cabinet full of trophies they would agree he was possibly the best angler of his time in South Wales. So, Larry's memory will stay with me forever A true Legend.

Next in my list of Legends is the famous Benny Ashurst



Benny Ashurst

The Legend that was Benny Ashurst A little before my time sadly to say. His rise to fame came, when he started fishing on his local 'Fir Tree Flash' pit,

Benny put his talents to use by winning seven big open matches in 1955. Then came nine open wins in 1956 against 500 competitors on venues like the Leeds & Liverpool Canal, Staf-



ford Canal, St Helens Canal, and the Lancaster Canal. At that time Benny felt his best performance was a win in the 1949 Northern AA match against 1,000 anglers on the 'Lanky' at Garstang.

Benny who was a maggot breeder was also an innovator of angling methods and techniques. One innovation he developed was the stick float. Using a small porcupine float and then fitted it with balsa wood tops attached to the line by a rubber ring at each end Fished with a double rubber based around a porcupine quill stem rather than heavy cane. "The prototype "stick" was born.

Casters and Benny Ashurst go hand in hand. Benny worked out how to commercially produce the sinking chrysalis - the vital key that transformed this bait into the powerful feed and hook bait medium it is today. Benny was a great match angler who, through his winning performances on the northern canals and the River Trent, shot the caste bait to dizzy heights during the 1960's.

Benny's greatest ambition was to win the National Angling Championship individual title. He did not get the luck he deserved, but his Stoke team took the 1969 Trent National Angling Championship Team title. It was not much of a surprise as they had some great anglers drawn from Warrington, Manchester, and Stockport. They had dominated matches on the Trent, with the fixed spool reel, stick float and caster since the early sixties, winning a three-match series against the Nottingham centrepin anglers as early as 1963.

With the increased publicity surrounding these challenge matches, news of the stick float and casters as bait quickly spread to the rest of the country.

Benny will go down in the annuls of angling history as a real pioneer and legend and father to who in my opinion became the World Best Match Angler Kevin Ashurst







HALL OF FAME

Another of our top ten greatest anglers who learned from his famous father, Kevin Ashurst honed his angling skills travelling with dad Benny around the flashes and canals of Lancashire. On the Trent, in the 1960s and 1970s, Kevin was almost invincible. He never kept a record of his match wins or top placings.



Let's just scratch the surface and mention a few of his great successes. In 1965, he set the Trent six-hour match record with 41-11-0 in the Nottingham AA annual open at Shelford. Not a big weight by today's commercial standards, but a phenomenal weight at that time. Just for the record, Leicester's Ivan Marks filled second spot with 39-14-8. Kevin also held the four-hour Trent match record with 28lbs. Thrashed the opposition

In the 1968 NFA Knockout Competition Final at Coombe Abbey, Kevin thrashed the opposition and netted £2,000 in prize money to boot. He won the Gladding Masters on the Warwickshire Avon against the top anglers in the country, and was quoted as saying, "It was nowt but a little sweep."

How about the Benson and Hedges Classic in Ireland, where he now lives for six months of the year, with a stunning 331lbs of roach taken over three days? Kevin fished for Leicester AS in the Angling Times Winter Leagues, winning the 1964 final on the River Suck with 56lbs. In the National Championships he has fished for Warrington, Stoke City, the mighty Birmingham AA, where he accumulated a vast array of team and individual medals, and finally Stockport.

Like his father, Kevin dearly wanted to win the National Championship. He had two section wins with an individual fourth place on the Trent in 1969, where he was also a member of the winning Stoke team. In the same match his father Benny was eighth. Kevin went on to secure a further individual fourth and a ninth place in the National. Fishing for England

Nominated by Stoke, 'Big Kev' fished for England in the 1970 Holland World Champion-ships under the guidance of Bernard Donovan. It's no wonder that from 1972, when Stan Smith handpicked his team to compete in the World Championships, Kevin became an automatic choice. He made 23 appearances for England and can be credited with bringing world match tactics back to the UK, educating the English anglers to abandon their rods and reels in favour of the pole. He showed the way by winning the four hundred pegger Liverpool Echo competition on the Leeds & Liverpool Canal, which was thought to be the first match on that canal to be won with the pole.

The highlight for Kevin was his 1982 World Angling Championship triumph on the Newry Canal, becoming the first British angler to win the world title on the pole. He went on to win individual silver medals in 1987, 1990 and 1991, plus numerous gold and silver team medals, including England's first ever 1985 team gold in Florence.



Gerald added: 'We'll certainly make representations to the Home Secretary, and try to find a way forward'.




Feedermasters Bait-Tech pairs at Hallcroft fishery. Going into round 3 myself and Frankie Gianoncelli Fishing found ourselves in 5th place 20lb off the lead. So we needed a big round ∠C. Well my drawing arm was on fire → as i pulled out moat 20 for me and bridge 17 for Tank → Two great areas ✓.

I decided on a 3 line attack, 32m, 13m and 6m. 10ft aventus steve ringer rods for 13m and 6m and an 11ft for 32m.

Kicked off at 32m and had a pound skimmer first cast on 4 bloodworm on a size 18 guru f1 maggot hook. 30 minutes later i had a roach and then got bitted out by tiny roach. Came into 13m and a big skimmer 1lb . Then nothing before on the hour the roach started to appear here too. They were small but eventually decided to fish for them and gradually the stamp improved. I even had a great run late on at 6m to finish with 144/perch,tiny skimmers and 3 decent skimmers. These went 21lb 2oz so happy with that although feel i should have committed to roach earlier. Frankie chipped in with 15lb plus 6. And we won the pairs on the day 5. Better still we are up to 3rd in the league and now 10lb behind the leaders with 2 rounds to go 6. Mix wise i used Ringers f1 black flour sieved to reduce the food content. Mixed slightly over wet to give it a bit of weight.

WELCOME TO MY ULTIMATE GUIDE TO FEEDER FISHING

IT WASN'T that long ago that fishing the feeder was viewed as an inferior way of catching, almost a last resort that required less skill and more luck than fishing the pole or waggler. Times have changed a bit since then!

In fact, fishing the feeder has become a bit of an 'in vogue' thing in the UK and indeed across the continent with new feeder-only match competitions springing up every few months and more and more tackle companies producing feeder kit to keep pace with the demand.

And I suppose I've been at the vanguard of this trend, having been lucky enough to be selected for the England Feeder Team in 2011 and then be crowned World Champion in 2014.

The feeder is a method I love, whether that's casting a long way for bream at Ferry Meadows or plopping a tiny Method to the far side of a snake lake. What I love the most is that, like any way of fishing, there are lots of little things that you can do to get a bite.

Steve has collated this easy to follow Feeder fishing series from all his articles and has condensed this fascinating insight to what is believed the Ultimate Guide to Feeder Fishing. Picking the correct rod will make hitting your mark an absolute doddle.

PICK THE RIGHT ROD FOR THE JOB

Does a 12ft rod make any difference to your fishing? Steve reckons so...

OW times have changed! When I was a kid I had one feeder rod that could be used for everything from catching bream on rivers to throwing out a bomb with a bit of corn on the end for carp.

Not today, though. That's because every good tackle manufacturer now makes a range of feeder rods to achieve very specific jobs – such has been the changing face of fishing in the UK over the past 30 years.

Commercial carp have played a big role in that, but on rivers and lakes we've found the need for longer and more powerful rods for bream and skimmers. The days of giving yourself a hernia trying to cast 60 yards with an 11ft rod are thankfully no more!

For casting up to 90 yards, a 13ft feeder rod will make the job so much easier, whereas a gentle lob with a small feeder would suit a 9ft or 10ft bomb-style rod.


Action needs to be considered when picking a rod. What I look for is backbone in the lower part to provide casting power, changing to a softer through action in the middle and tip of the rod to avoid lost fish on the strike.

Too soft a rod and you won't be able to cast accurately... too stiff and you'll lose more fish than you land. Finding the balance is key.

QUIVERTIP EYES

Just as you would when considering rings on the main rod, so the guides on a quivertip should be correct.
Braid fishing requires bigger rings to let shockleader knots pass through, while straight mono fishing suits standard guides.






UST as it is vital to pick a rod that's suited to the type of feeder fishing that you plan on doing, so too should the reel that's going to be strapped on to the handle be fully capable of getting the job done.

This is something I've learned in the last decade or so, when I've found more and more of my feeder work requiring longer casts. A normal match-type reel hasn't got the guts to go the distance. These smaller reels are built for trotting floats or casting wagglers up to 30

yards. Beyond this they struggle.

Fortunately, the big-carp world has stepped in. Carp anglers regularly cast over 100 yards and use massive reels to suit – so by slimming these 'big pit' models down to suit match fishing, we now have big reels for big casts. The difference they make is astounding.

But if you don't need one of these beasts for your feeder fishing, you can invest in a feeder-type reel. This will share many of the traits of a mini big pit, but at half the size and price!







THE REELS STEVE USES...

RATHER than getting bogged down with several reels on my rods, I've cut my choice down to just two Daiwa models for all my feeder work both at home and when fishing abroad. Although both come in different sizes, I find that one size really does fit all!

DAIWA TDR 4012A

TDRs are legendary among float anglers in the smaller sizes and the bigger 4012A is just perfect in terms of size, power and casting for much of my general feeder work on commercial fisheries and lakes. It packs a lot of winding power and I do get asked a lot why I use such a heavy reel. My answer is that I'm not actually holding the rod unless I'm playing a fish, so it doesn't matter!

t's all too easy to look at a peg and instantly assume it should be attacked with a pole because the fish are within pole reach. However, Andy Findlay believes there's a tactic that'll outscore the pole nine times out of 10. A straightforward, precise feeder tactic that'll win you more matches than any other approach this year. Over to Andy...

This is one of my favourite tactics – I win loads of matches doing it throughout the year. In fact I won the match yesterday doing this very thing and it works at every venue (where allowed), especially for big fish. The bigger the fish, the better it works.

With any feeder fishing it's all about accuracy and this is no different. Technique

A mould ensures the best bait loading possible.

is the key and I'll use this at ranges up to 25 metres. With this tactic I'm achieving a very positive solid setup that isn't affected by wind and tow.

The idea is to get your loaded feeder into the swim, catch one fish and repeat the process just like when you're using pole-mounted pots. The beauty with this tactic however, is that you're not feeding bait via a pole pot, which can spread out as it sinks. Instead this sinks to the bottom in one compact, neat little pile so everything is one easy mouthful for the carp.

It works when fished up against islands or in open water and my results and experience show that it outfishes the pole more often than not

I've opted for a 10ft Supera rod, which has





unclip the line from the line clip, otherwise when you get a bite and a big fish rips off it'll simply break your line or you'll pull the hook out. Either way you're going to lose that fish, which completely defeats the object.

I set the clutch so the reel will give line

relatively freely and I also tie a small stop knot of line on to my main line, which ensures that I can clip up in the same spot again every time. As with all of my fishing, accuracy is what makes ALL the difference.

LIKE A HAWK

Just because you're feeder fishing don't think you can just relax and have a good look around while your feeder is in the water. Watch that tip like a hawk – it's a relatively light feeder and if you get a liner that moves it then you need to recast.

In the summer months I'll use a heavier 28g version for this same job, but because temperatures are still cool a smaller feeder is a better option – it makes far less disturbance, which is crucial. I always say that if you can get your feeder into a swim with minimal disturbance

you'll get quicker bites.

I actually fish with my rod pointing at where I've cast the feeder, with very little or no angle. This is so I can be 100 per cent accurate with where my feeder is landing. It must sink on a tight line so you can ensure it lands pin-perfect every time. When you get a bite the rod tip simply lifts

up. You'll have no trouble spotting bites and providing you're paying attention you'll afford yourself plenty of time to deal with fast bites or big fish.



The simple rule is: small feeder and loads of bait! I pack as much bait as possible on

to my feeder and very often 'double skin' the loading process to ensure there's as much bait as possible packed on to it.

I always bury the hook bait in between the two layers. Do not leave your hook bait hanging outside the feeder – it defeats the object of the game. Think of it as a cherry right in the middle of the cake.

BITE TIMES

Be prepared to wait! Today I've had bites as quickly as the feeder has landed, but often in colder water temperatures you need to wait for bites. You must do all of the groundwork beforehand to ensure the bait is right and the feeder is in the perfect spot; then you have the confidence to sit and wait for bites.

Bites are coming thick and fast as the session progresses, which proves my point that even in cold water this is THE tactic to beat. There are so many ways you can approach any given peg, but if you keep things straightforward and concentrate on doing everything with precision the rewards are there for the taking. I have only fished

By the turn of the century in 2000 England had amassed 6 Gold 4 Silver and 2 Bronze team medals but the icing on the cake was even more impressive with individuals winning 9 Gold 5 Silver and 2 Bronze. Dave Roper in 1985, Tom Pickering 1989, Bob Nudd 1990/1991/1994/1999 and of course Alan Scotthorne 1996/1997/1998.

In 2000 I decided to step down as team manager of the Nations side and I appointed Mark Downes and Mark Addy as joint managers of Team England. Did the winning streak stop well absolutely not with another shed full of medals being won by both team and individuals.

England are in a great position now and long may it continue with all aspects of FIPSed championships being contested.

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




Shoal mates

TRAVEL ROD WINNER

Do all fish swim in shoals?
David Washington,
Tyne and Wear.

Pr lan Welch says...
From an angler's
perspective, shoaling might
appear to be a relatively
straightforward subject: all
anglers know that bream are
shoal fish, pike are not, roach
shoal, barbel don't, cats are
loners, rudd are gregarious, and
so on. Sadly, when it comes to the
science behind shoaling, it is not
quite as simple as that!

Firstly, there is a need to distinguish between shoaling and schooling – terms that tend to be used interchangeably by anglers, but which are, in fact, very different behaviours.

Shoaling

Shoaling is a relatively loose term for any group of fish that associate and interact with one another on a social level. Fish shoals may have individuals of different sizes, sometimes different species.

Schooling

Schooling is a more complex behaviour. A school comprises individual fish of the same species, usually of the same size, moving together in a controlled and coordinated fashion — 'synchronised swimming', as it were, with the school acting as if it were one individual. This behaviour is more common in the marine environment, with herrings a typical schooling species.

For our freshwater species,

shoaling behaviour is most common and, although less structured than schooling, it is still a complex social behaviour that has evolved to fulfil a number of different functions, most notably predator avoidance, foraging success and reproductive success.

Predator avoidance

'Safety in numbers' is a bit of a clichéd expression, but by creating a number of different moving targets, shoal fish seek to confuse a predator by sensory overload, making it difficult for the attacker to pick out an individual target.

There is an evolutionary organisation at play in many shoals, too, as older fish will often be tightly shoaled in the middle of the group,

with the younger, smaller fish at the periphery. This ensures that the larger, breeding fish are better protected, as any predator will usually pick off a target at the edge of the shoal.

Foraging

Scientific experiments have shown that cyprinids find food more efficiently when shoaled, and that behavioural changes allow for transfer of information between the shoal mates. To use another old saying, 'many hands make light work', so it is that many fish searching tend to find food more effectively.

Feeding success is increased by shoaling in some predator species, too. Most will have seen film footage of dolphins 'herding' prey species into a 'food ball', but in freshwater, both perch and zander maximise their prey capture by operating in 'packs',

Reproductive success

It is evident that being in a tight group with other members of your species makes



finding a spawning partner very energy efficient. There is no need to hunt or display to find a mate, as they are all around you.

As far as shoal structure is concerned, some species, and salmon are a key example, demonstrate a pronounced sibling recognition and tend to only shoal with the fish that they were hatched with. Many other species exhibit a similar trait and form their shoaling associations with their brothers and sisters, but over time, due to disease and predation etc., the number in a given year class shoal decreases. So it is that you find fewer, large shoals of big fish.

Mixed year class shoaling is not uncommon, though, and there are also many examples of mixed species shoaling, too. Chub, for example, will often shoal with roach. In mixed-size shoals, as previously mentioned, the larger fish will usually congregate in the centre, but many have a social 'pecking order', with the larger fish usually having priority over food.

Interestingly, angling pressure may change this behaviour, and I have seen many examples in heavily-pressured barbel swims of the bigger fish sitting well back Pike do not ordinarily shoal, but males do group together at spawning time, awaiting the arrival of a gravid female.

from a baited patch, allowing the smaller, younger fish to get their heads down first... Sound familiar?

Seasonal shoaling

Some shoaling behaviour is distinctly seasonal, and many cyprinid species exhibit distinct winter shoaling behaviour, usually in response to temperature, current, shelter or light requirements. These winter shoals may be very different from summer ones, and will vary between waters, depending upon the nature of the habitat.

When electrofishing for example, I have discovered almost the entire barbel population of a river section gathered together under a single feature. Similarly, big numbers of tench may often be found under a few distinct areas of decaying weed in the colder months.


Seasonality will also cause shoaling of species that do not ordinarily shoal. The spring congregations of male pike is an obvious example, as they group together awaiting the arrival of a gravid female. Conversely, some species that usually form dense


shoals will become territorial at spawning time. Three and ten-spined sticklebacks usually form dense shoals, but the males become territorial nest builders at spawning time.

Summary

Most of our freshwater fish fauna will form a 'shoal' at some time in their life cycle, in response to varying seasons or environmental conditions. Other species will tend to shoal no matter what and, as always, angling success depends upon exploiting the science!
